Sideline beekeepers are people who have another source of income to rely on, and use beekeeping as an attempt to generate more money. They may take care of 300 bee colonies. The last classification is the commercial beekeeper. They control up to 50, 000 bee colonies and produce about 60% of the world's honey. As a beekeeper, an individual can make up to \$44,000 in the United States.

Agricultural Career: Beekeeper

Beekeepers are people who take care of honeybees. Those in this profession keep the bees in boxes, where the bees form honeycombs, which stores the honey. The bees are able to come and go as they please, but always return. Honeybees contribute several products like honey, beeswax, and pollen.

There are different types of beekeepers as well. Some beekeepers may produce these commodities, while others breed queen bees for other beekeepers. These different types of beekeepers are classified under three names. The first is hobby beekeepers. Hobby beekeepers serves as an activity for those interested in ecology and science. These people usually only take care of a few hives and it allows them to produce an extra source of income due to the demand for honey.
